

### MACD is Awarded \$8 Million

You can do a whole lot with \$8 million! The Michigan Association of Conservation Districts (MACD), in partnership with the Michigan Forest Association (MFA) and the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), knows exactly where it is needed. This money is going to fund cost-share and administrative support for practices that mitigate climate change and enhance forest resilience. With a reduced cost barrier, MACD hopes that more landowners will be able to promote and protect the health of their forests. This funding exists though investments from the Inflation Reduction Act.

"MACD is excited to receive this funding, which empowers us to assist Michigan's small and under-served landowners in adopting forestry practices that enhance carbon sequestration," said MACD Executive Director Rivka Hodgekinson. The Climate Resilience Fund and the Climate Stewardship Fund will focus on assistance for under-served landowners, offering cost-share payments of up to 100% of their actual expenses. Sounds like a win to us!

# **Upcoming Grants in Dickinson County**

#### Save Our Shores:

### Improving Shoreline Health of Inland Lakes Through Restoration and Education

Near-shore aquatic habitat is crucially important to lake health. Human activity has caused some areas of shoreline to become disrupted or hardscaped. Loss of shoreline habitat means fewer shoreline aquatic plants, which means less runoff filtration, which means more pollution makes it into the lakes. Dickinson Conservation District has partnered with Iron Baraga Conservation District to address this issue, and 12 inland lakes located within the two conservation districts have been selected for survey. All of the inland lakes selected are heavily used for recreation and/or undergoing development of their shorelines.

The survey will enable the conservation districts to identify the three sites most in need of restoration. Educational material will be provided to stakeholders at or near the selected sites. The third component to this grant is the actual restoration work to be performed at the selected sites. Native plants will be restored with the goal of reestablishing the natural filtration systems that keep inland lake water clean. Afterwards, monitoring will be conducted to ensure success.

Funding is being provided by WE Energies and work will begin in early 2025. Thank you, WE Energies, for enabling us to do this important work. Thank you, Iron Baraga Conservation District for partnering with us!

#### Fumee Creek Watershed Grant

A "watershed" is an area of land that channels rainfall, snow melt, and runoff into a common body of water. The Fumee Creek Watershed covers much of Iron Mountain, Kingsford, Quinnesec, and Norway. In 2002, Dickinson Conservation District sampled water quality at various sites within the watershed.

Now that a substantial amount of time has passed, it is time to sample the same sites used in 2002, as well as a few new sites. To this end, we will measure the temperature, dissolved oxygen, biochemical oxygen demand (how much oxygen it takes for organic material to decompose), nitrates, phosphates, pH, conductivity, total hardness, total suspended solids (the amount of solid particles suspended in the water), Michigan 10 metals, low level mercury, chloride, and E. Coli. The goal is to evaluate water quality change over time, increase public awareness about stormwater's impact on surface water quality, and to form partnerships with local stakeholders to discuss water quality and stormwater impacts within the watershed. The eventual goal is the formation of a watershed council, responsible for staying abreast of water quality issues within the Fumee watershed.
